2 INTRODUCTION

One of the main objectives of the SPRING project was to identify successful and sustainable practices of integration of newly arrived migrants. In this task, the practices assembled in Task 3.1 underwent an assessment along the benchmarks specified in Task 3.2 (Validation Grid) and a database of validated practices was generated.

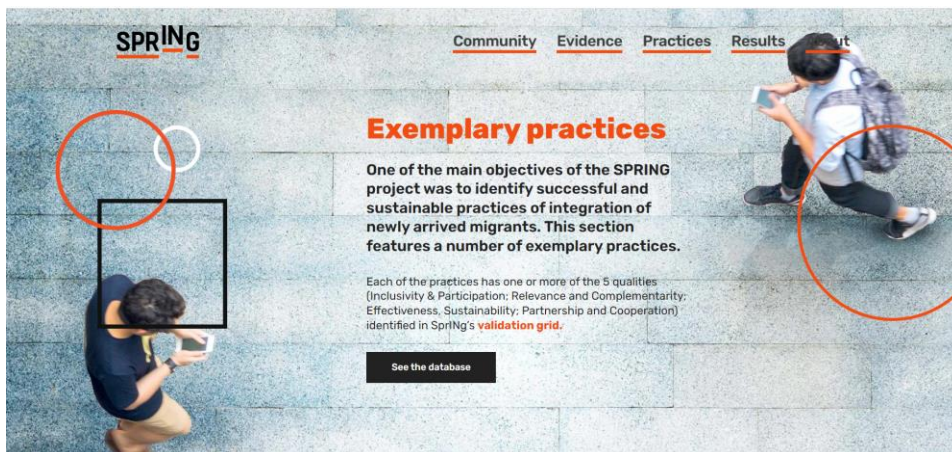
Validated practices were collected through 'Join us' campaign on SPRING platform, some SPRING partners, and sub-contracted national experts in 10 member states (Belgium, Spain, Italy, France, Germany, Austria, Poland, Finland, Czechia, and Denmark). National experts collected and validated potential practices and MPG gathered 43 validated practices in total.

3 DEVELOPMENT OF THE VALIDATED PRACTICES DATABASE

As an initial step in creating the validated practices database, Migration Policy Group developed a validation grid with a set of criteria for sustainable and successful practices. The aim of this grid is to provide an evaluation tool to examine different aspects of migrant integration practices to assess their quality. It consists of five main criteria, relevant key questions, and checklist items. The checklist items represent the fundamental features every migrant integration practice should strive for.

As a second step, MPG started to gather practices to be validated (via SPRING 'Join us' campaign and with assistance from SPRING partners). In addition, MPG subcontracted national experts from 10 Member State countries (Belgium, Spain, Italy, France, Germany, Austria, Poland, Finland, Czechia, and Denmark) to support MPG in gathering and validating integration good practices, by conducting desk research and drawing on existing good practice repositories at Member State level. After mutual agreements, individual sessions were held with each expert to introduce the validation grid and train them about how to use it.



Experts collected and analysed 39 practices by 30 June 2022. They applied the robust set of criteria and validated the projects, measures, initiatives, etc. By using validation grid, they also assessed the transferability and adaptability of good practices.

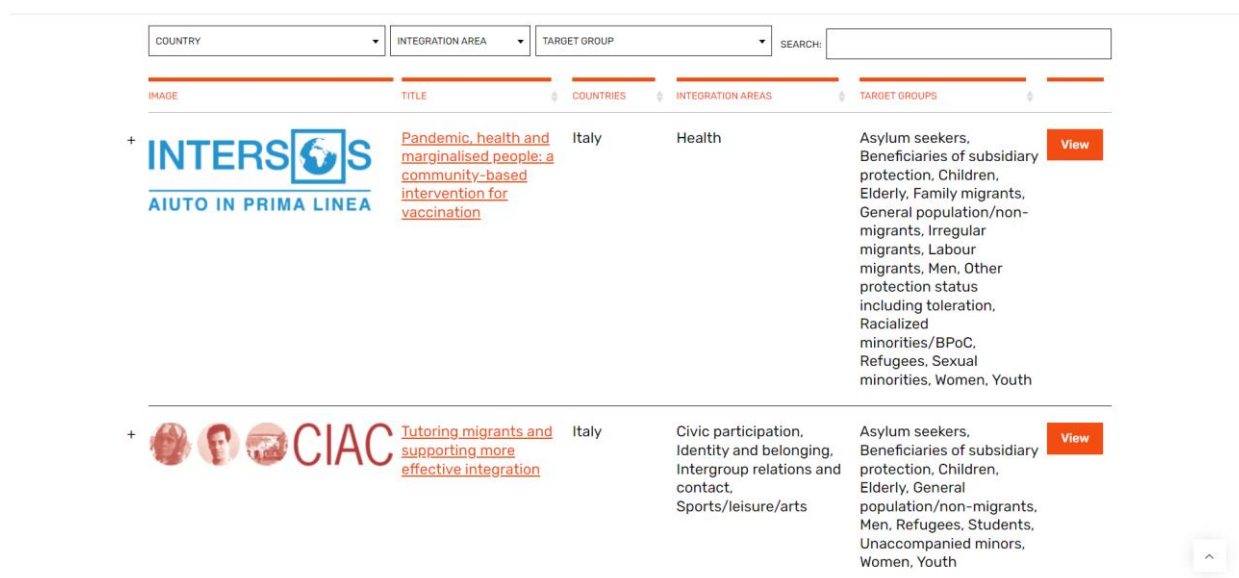
Selected practices could focus on any integration area, at any level (local, regional, national), with any funding (public, private, mix etc). In general, we favoured of practices which were still active or recently finalized.

A few other practices were validated by SPRING partner ICMC Europe through their members and the total number of practices became 43. This process resulted in a growing number of validated practices that are showcased in the SPRING online interactive repository (WP 5, Task 5.1) together with practical templates/material that can be used or adapted, as well as access to the people and communities behind the practices.

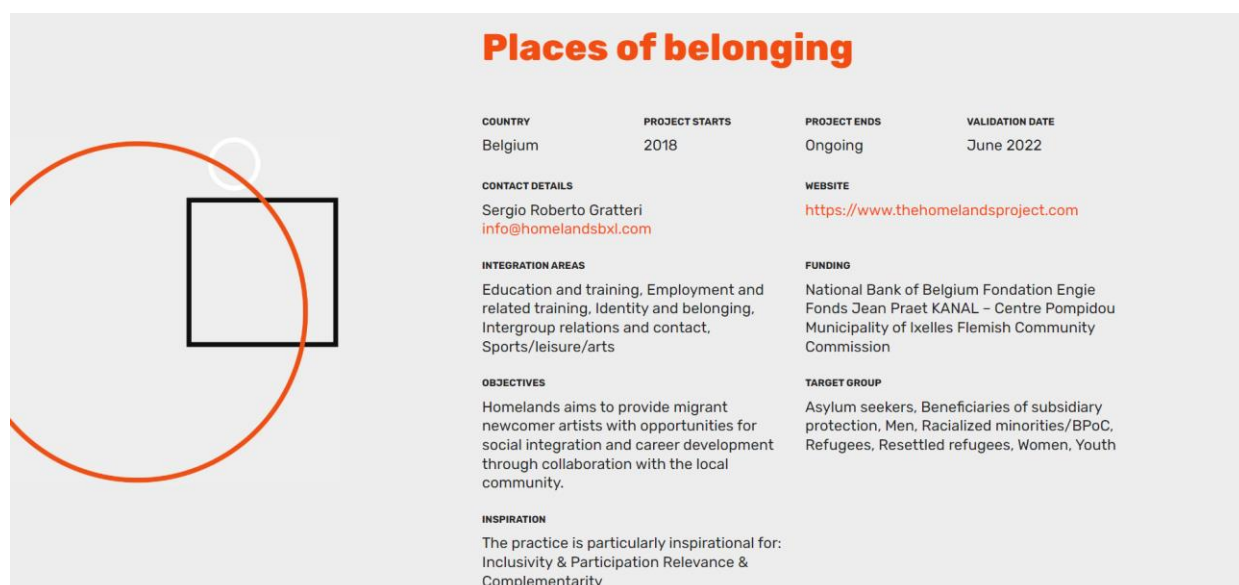
Practices were edited and proofread by MPG staff. The format of practices was arranged according to the platform and the most relevant and useful information about the practices was highlighted.

Exemplary practices database did not aim to bring together “best’ practices’ in all criteria. The objective was to highlight the features that would be particularly inspirational for other practitioners. In other words, a practice can be exemplary in terms of inclusivity but not for partnership and collaboration. It can still be in the database as a good inclusive practice.

As a next step, the database will be showcased in other EU dissemination platforms (EWSI, Education Gateway, labor market best practices, etc.).



Users can filter validated practices by their target group, country and integration areas. They can also use search function to access tailored information. All validated practices have a designated page on the SPRING platform.
